Health Education – Community Health Concentration

The Health Education major with concentration in Community Health is for self-directed students who would like a career as a practitioner of community health or who would like to pursue graduate studies in this area. This curriculum provides practical field experiences and experiential coursework to prepare students for careers in public or private agencies; local health departments; volunteer organizations; hospitals; health insurance companies; worksite/corporate health promotion and wellness programs; and a variety of community-based organizations and projects (such as smoking cessation programs, health and cancer associations, substance abuse agencies, nutrition interventions, HIV/AIDS prevention programs, and injury prevention initiatives). **This program does not yield a teaching certificate, however, this curriculum is specifically designed to prepare students for to take the Certified Health Education Specialist (CHES) exam, which is given by the National Commission for Health Education Credentialing, Inc. (NCHEC) and ensures that students are trained and qualified to plan and coordinate health education programs. Upon completion of this program students would be prepared to take the CHES Examination.** The program for Health consists of University General Education Requirements (Competency Requirements and Inquiry Requirements), College Requirements, Health Education: Community Health major coursework and options for elective courses.

Admission to Health Education – Community Health Concentration

Students are directly admitted to this program from high school or another institution of higher learning by completing an admission application to the University, selecting major: Health Education and concentration: Community Health on the admission application, and acceptance to Wayne State University.

Degree Requirements

Students must complete all University General Education requirements, all College and program requirements, and a minimum of 120 credits with a cumulative grade point average of 2.50 or higher to earn a bachelor’s degree in the College of Education.

Important Restrictions

- **No grade below a “C” may be used to meet College Requirements, electives, courses in the major or courses in a College of Education minor. Note: All students must receive a “C” or higher in Basic and Intermediate Composition if these requirements are completed or transferred in Fall 2008 or thereafter. A grade of “C-” is not acceptable.**
- **Not more than 64 semester hours from a two-year school or schools will apply toward graduation.**

Michigan Transfer Agreement (MTA)

Students transferring to WSU with MTA in fall 2018 and beyond will have satisfied **all** of Wayne State General Education requirements. All college, program, major and minor requirements must also be completed (at least 120 credits) for students who fulfill the MTA requirements.

Your community college will provide detailed information, including approved courses, for completing the MTA. We recommend that you review our transfer plans and consult your community college advisor about fulfilling MTA requirements and how to request an MTA transcript evaluation.

It is the student's responsibility to become familiar with and to complete all requirements for the program.

Undergraduate Student Exclusion Policy

The Kinesiology, Health, and Sports Studies (KHS) division of the College of Education values the student experience and endeavors to ensure that our students have the opportunities, tools, and support to succeed. Students are encouraged to seek assistance from their instructors, counselors or advisors.

The individual program areas in KHS review the academic records of each student at the close of every academic term. If sufficient academic progress, as described below and by program requirements, is not attained, a student may be considered for program exclusion, which will result in the cancellation of any future course enrollments in KHS and removal from the KHS program.

The following criteria will be used to determine exclusion for inadequate academic progress:

KHS Undergraduate students may be excluded if you:

- Have taken and earned below a C in a core/major course twice – no overrides will be granted for a third attempt.
- Fail to earn at least a 2.50 semester GPA in the term following the placement of an academic probation hold.
- Earned or maintained a cumulative GPA below a 2.50 for more than three academic semesters after completing 40+ credits at WSU.
- Violate the *Academic Integrity* policy pursuant to the Student Code of Conduct.

Note: The 2.50 cumulative GPA is required for College of Education undergraduate students and exceeds the minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA used by the University to determine academic probation. This policy applies to Level 2 students and students directly admitted to programs without the Level 1 and 2 distinction.
